What happens when one of the most essential pillars of community responses to poverty fails during a major economic downturn? In

the case of civil legal aid for the poor in Nebraska, we did not have to answer that question.

While legal aid programs across the country downsized because of crippling cuts to their revenues, Legal Aid of Nebraska kept its staff and ended 2009 without being forced to tap into our cash reserves.

Instead, Legal Aid actually expanded its services to the poor:

- We secured new funding to enhance and promote our statewide ElderAccessLine[®].
- We began a program offering legal representation and training for domestic violence victims and advocates in the Winnebago, Omaha, and Santee Sioux tribes.
- We began a new medical-legal partnership serving cancer patients at the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

All told, we provided legal representation, advice, and information to nearly 10 percent more people in 2009 than 2008.

It's all about surviving the storm so that others who count on you stay dry.

But we did not end the year without challenges. National studies show that for every person who accesses legal aid, one gets turned away. That is certainly the case in Nebraska. With more than one out of six Nebraskans eligible for our services, the need is great and grows every day.

As always, fundraising for our mission is an ongoing challenge. We lost a federal grant for domestic violence work due to flat-lined funding, and the state Interest on Lawyers Trust Accounts (IOLTA) program has been decimated by reduced economic activity and low interest rates.

Legal Aid survived a major threat in the Nebraska State Legislature in the fall. In addressing the budget deficit, the Unicameral considered a bill that would have, among other things, redirected dollars from the Legal Aid and Services Fund filing fee to the General Fund. Fortunately our friends in and out of the legislature rallied and the filing fee was preserved. And, federal legal services funding substantially increased for the second year in a row.

Notwithstanding the vagaries of fiscal fortunes we are doing well for our clients, as evidenced by a recent assessment by the US Government. During a week-long visit in November, the Legal Services Corporation (LSC) – a federally financed, nonprofit corporation charged by Congress to regulate and fund civil legal services for the poor – assessed the performance of Legal Aid of Nebraska's

legal representation, financial management and general operations.

Their report found that "Legal Aid of Nebraska's delivery structure is marked by a commitment to high quality work and a holistic approach. LAN regards itself as a law firm, a culture that is evidenced among staff, management and the board.

The work that the program does is strategically tied to the needs in the community. Overall, the program is highly effective in engaging with the low-income population. Its high quality legal work is conducted in a way so as to achieve the best outcomes for its clients."

LSC also found that Legal Aid of Nebraska outperforms its peer organizations in other states: "The firm's case closings are well above national medians. In 2008, LAN closed 527 cases per 10,000 low-income persons in its service area. This compares to the national median of cases closed per 10,000 poor of 254. In 2008, LAN closed 1,331 extended service cases (15.9 percent of the total cases) and 7,056 limited service cases (84.1 percent of the total cases). This amounts to 80 extended service cases per 10,000 poor and is [51 percent] higher than the national median of 53."

Legal Aid's financial management was also praised: "[The] financial administration staff has established systems and procedures which could well benefit the national legal aid community."

And, despite our loss of federal domestic violence funding, LAN was able to garner significant private financial support along with other leveraged dollars to maintain our current services for victims of DV, including our instant access hotline for victims.

So now we look forward. In late 2010, Legal Aid will embark on a new legal Needs Assessment of the client population. A lot has changed since our landmark 2007 Client Needs Assessment report. In reviewing that report, I was pleased to see how many of the findings, later incorporated in our 2008 strategic planning document, have been fully implemented as part of our practice.

I am looking forward to working with our staff, Board and stake-holders in engaging the civil legal services constituency to shore up what works and see where we go next as a firm. Also in 2010 Legal Aid will initiate a new three-year Bar Campaign to enhance and expand attorney support of Legal Aid's services.

I am sure that all of our current supporters will be as generous as they have been (if not more so) and I eagerly anticipate partnering with our campaign committees to attract new donors to our mission.

That mission – "To promote Justice, Dignity, Hope and Self-sufficiency through quality civil legal aid for those who have no where else to turn" – is what a strong and vital civil legal services provider for the poor is all about. It's the income maintained. It's the shelter preserved. It's the safety ensured. It is the shelter from the storm.

Providing Legal Services in a Tough Economy

Legal Aid continues to extend its reach and effectiveness by partnering with other organizations to meet the needs of low-income Nebraskans, by employing and upgrading the use of technology and by working smarter – whenever possible.

The following articles tell how we provided our critical services during one of the toughest periods of U.S. history — a recession that doesn't seem to end.

Joining with Other Organizations Extends Our Reach

A unique medical-legal partnership begun in 2009 by Legal Aid of Nebraska and The Nebraska Medical Center, is helping cancer patients deal with legal problems.

The partnership began when Executive Direct David Pantos met with Kerry Rodabaugh, M.D., associate professor in obstetrics-gynecology and a gynecological oncologist at The NU Nebraska Medical Center who had moved to Omaha from Buffalo, N.Y.

"I found myself taking care of women with recurrent cervical cancer, and when it's recurrent, it's usually terminal," Dr. Rodabaugh said. "Many of these women were single parents with young children and had no legal arrangements in place for the children."

So Dr. Rodabaugh pioneered a medical-legal partnership in Buffalo to handle the problems cancer patients would encounter, such as custody issues, powers of attorney, foreclosures and benefit advocacy. Convinced of the program's effectiveness, Dr. Rodabaugh brought the idea with her to Omaha, eventually meeting up with Pantos.

"Dr. Rodabaugh told me about her experience with a successful medical-legal partnership for cancer patients and it made perfect sense that a similar program could work well in Omaha," Pantos said. "Legal Aid drafted an agreement, which received input from attorney Howard Hahn, working on behalf of The Nebraska Medical Center. Luckily, Hahn is a former president of the Legal Aid board of directors."

"I think this shows that we're paying attention to the entire patient," Rodabaugh said. "We're not just taking care of cancer with chemotherapy, radiation and surgery. We're addressing everything else that goes into the treatment of the individual."



As part of the Legal Aid – NU Medical Center agreement, a Legal Aid attorney is always available to consult on issues over the phone and visits the hospital and its clinics once a week. There, attorney Ann Mangiameli meets right at the bedside with cancer patients, working them through their legal issues. So far, both partners consider the process a great success.

"The Nebraska Medical Center is heavily involved and supportive of this program," Pantos said. "Their social work staff, oncology-hematology department and many other groups are totally invested, and their cancer patients are the ultimate winners."

Legal Aid Deputy Director Annette Farnan said the partner-ship has also been positive for Nebraska Medical Center patients from outside of Nebraska, particularly lowa. "Many cancer patients come to the medical center from western lowa, so we brought in lowa Legal Aid as an unfunded partner," Farnan said. "I would not be surprised if the idea catches on so well there that they develop their own medical – legal partnership at lowa's top hospitals."

Legal Aid and Creighton University Provide Migrant Outreach

Legal Aid of Nebraska and Creighton University in 2009 partnered together to assist migrant workers and families throughout the state.

The initiative, dubbed the Nebraska Migrant Action Coalition, brought together migrant workers and their families at churches, community halls and other public places to learn more about their rights. Legal Aid's Kay Strong coordinated

the outreach in conjunction with Creighton's Director of Multicultural Affairs, Ricardo Ariza.

Ariza recruited Creighton students to assist the effort. Some met with migrant families in July to perform glaucoma screenings in Scottsbluff and Imperial. Others helped Legal Aid representatives explain the finer points of their rights on issues such as landlord tenant conflicts, family law, health care, abuse, banking and housing. Creighton's students represented a variety of disciplines, including pre-law and social sciences.

Strong and Legal Aid's Valentina Saavedra also produced a hand-book explaining many of these legal issues in both English and Spanish. "It was very user friendly," said Annette Farnan, deputy director:

Strong said she expects the initiative to continue in 2010, with Ariza recruiting students and Legal Aid staffers to assist the effort. The Coalition's focus will be primarily on central and north central Nebraska migrant communities.

Client: Legal Aid Changed My Life

Assisting with domestic violence cases continued unabated in 2009 after Legal Aid of Nebraska lost its funding under the Justice Department's VAWA program.

Private donors provided the necessary funds for Legal Aid attorneys to assist families in crisis, including a case handled by Kelly Boswell.

A Legal Aid client who faced a much-needed divorce and child custody situation came to Boswell for help. The woman's husband was physically abusive, hitting and kicking her at every opportunity.

Boswell said that getting the woman her own safe place to live was a "combination effort" and that "everybody but the husband was helping out." The husband was not working and threatened to never pay child support. The wife believed he was selling drugs to avoid paying child support and he told her he planned to never work again.

The victim's in-laws and a friend offered her places to stay – rent free – and saved her money so she could get a place of her own. She also needed transportation and used her tax refund to buy a new car.

Once the woman's basic necessities were met, she found a job working as a prison guard. Her newfound salary helped her pay for an apartment of her own, and, with state help, she found daycare for her children. Once the wife was no longer economically dependent on the abusive husband, she was able to fully assert herself.

Legal Aid's Boswell got the woman a divorce along with full custody of her children in a default proceeding, due to the husband's uncooperative behavior.

At the conclusion of the representation, the grateful client returned a satisfaction survey in which she noted: "Mr. Boswell helped me tremendously. Now I have a great job and a new life and I'm very happy."

Publicity Delivers Legal Aid Message

Publicity is essential in getting Legal Aid's messages delivered to our many publics, including donors, potential donors, elected officials, lawmakers and others.

In 2009, the Legal Aid story appeared in newspapers and magazines, on statewide NET television. local television and on radio.

For instance, an article that appeared in the Norfolk, Neb., Daily News, told of the key role being played by the Rural Response Hotline: "The hotline is one of the primary services provided by the farm crisis Response Council through Interchurch Ministries of Nebraska. Housed in the farm law office of Legal Aid of Nebraska in Bancroft, it's the longest running farm and ranch hotline in the country."

Quoting Michelle Soll of Legal Aid's Bancroft office, the story also pointed out that the hotline fielded 3,888 calls the previous year, and those calls come literally from everywhere in Nebraska. "There's not one town that would be a new town to me," Soll told the newspaper.

Rural Response Hotline needed

KEARNEY — The year was
1984. Times were "really tough" on
the rural front, said Michelle Soll.
Land values were plunging. Foreclosures were soaring to a record
high and debt loads were mounting.
Economically distressed and
emotionally depressed farmers and
ranchers could reach out for assistance through the newly created
Nebraska Rural Response Hotline.
Today, 25 years later, the hotline
remains connected and continues to

Today, 25 years later, the hotline remains connected and continues to provide spiritual, emotional, legal and financial counseling to not only producers but others also affected by the rural crisis, said Soll, farm program director of Legal Aid of Nebraska.

The hotline is one of the primary services provided by the Farm Crisis Response Council through the the country Ministries of Nebraska. Housed in the farm law office of Nebraska Legal Services in Bancroft, it's the longest-running farm and ranch hotline in the country, she said.

The hotline fielded 3,888 calls in 2008, said Soll, who has been involved with the hotline for over 15 years. No community is exempt, Soll said, "There's not one town that ild be a new town to me," she

All changes are aimed at increasing ease of use and functionality. Clients now see a cleaner, easier-to-navigate home page, easy

access to staff directories, cleaner paths to important documents and phone numbers.

The search engine has been redesigned to assist users with legal issues. Visitors to the site can enter a brief description of their legal issues or questions and are then redirected to an accurate list of search results.

The Web Site also is used for communications and includes Legal Aid's Annual Reports and Briefly newsletters. Legal Aid also has joined Facebook, a social networking site that allows people to interact online.

Homeless Projects Needed More than Ever

Legal Aid's Homeless projects proved to be lifesavers in Lincoln and Omaha during the rough economic times of 2009.

Attorneys Lori Wilson and Pat Ford saw to it that small and large legal problems did not become "rock bottom" for hundreds of Nebraskans seriously down on their luck.

Wilson, who recently moved to the Grand Island office, encountered a man at the Peoples' City Mission, Lincoln's only homeless shelter. He qualified for Social Security Disability but those cases often take up to two years, Wilson noted. "In the meantime, these people are unable to work, have no income, and they sleep on the streets or at the mission."

After applying for help from Lancaster County's General Assistance program, the man was denied. That's when Wilson stepped in to handle an appeal and was able to provide proper documentation, including information about his prior employment. The client had left the job as

he was no longer able to perform his duties because of his disability.

In November, Wilson's client was approved for General Assistance. He now receives a stipend from that program, plus food stamps, and his approval qualified him for low-income housing.

Representing Nebraskans Sometimes Involves the World

Providing legal representation for low-income Nebraskans sometimes involves issues with roots far outside of the state's borders.

The Grand Island office discovered that in a 2009 matter involv-

ing Sudanese refugees who fled to central Nebraska to escape war and poverty in their North African native land.

Grand Island's strong agricultural community and meatpacking industry offered the refugees a chance at jobs, growth and family livelihood. While most Grand Islanders accepted their new neighbors, the refugees – some from opposite sides among warring tribes in the homeland – soon recognized they needed some sort of "organization" to assist them in their dealings with government and business.

Legal Aid of Nebraska stepped in and assisted the new Nebraskans in forming a non-profit corporation and we are currently helping

them obtain their federal 501(c)(3) status.

The new legal status facilitated the settlement of old tribal differences and helped them



receive financial aid and social coaching to assist in the transition to their new home. The newly organized approach became a key to legitimizing the population's status in Grand Island, showing a desire to participate in American social structures.

Legal Aid Staffers Provide Education

Under the 501(c)(3) umbrella, the refugees worked with local authorities including police to improve understanding of cultural differences.

In creating the non-profit organization, Legal Aid helped the Sudanese Refugee community take a giant step in the direction of self-sufficiency.

Awards Recognize Legal Aid's 2009 Performance

A pair of recent awards given by significant public service organizations have recognized Legal Aid of Nebraska's special efforts during 2009.

More than 350 people gathered at the Scott Conference Center for United Way of the Midlands' annual meeting and awards function. Among them were businesses and other supporters who helped generate \$21.1 million for the United Way,

Omaha Philanthropist Dick Holland was honored along with Legal Aid's Executive Director Dave Pantos. Holland received United Way's Citizen of the Year Award while Pantos accepted the Chair's Partnership Award for its work on behalf of refugees, asylees and immigrants on a path to citizenship.

"Thank you very much for this honor," said Pantos. "I must speak on behalf of Legal Aid – its board and staff – by appreciating how much United Way brings people together and organizations together in the community to find real solutions for those who need it the most."

"Legal Aid is to bring justice, hope and dignity through free, civil legal services for those who have no where else to turn, and certainly to these new Americans who are joining us every day from war-torn nations as refugees or as asylees," Pantos added.

"They are certainly the ones who have nowhere else to turn and the fact that the United Way supports Legal Aid, as well as our other partners, at the International Center who are providing these essential services is just remarkable and

essential services, is just remarkable and I really must personally praise their commitment to these new Americans."

In a second ceremony, The Domestic Violence Coordinating Council (DVCC) presented Legal Aid with its "Non-profit of the Year" Award.

The DVCC noted how Legal Aid continued to provide legal help to domestic violence victims in 2009 – despite losing a substantial portion of its government funding.

Pantos praised private donors who "came through" for Legal Aid so that all domestic violence programs could continue.

89 Percent of Revenue Spent on Services

Donors and other supporters of the mission of Legal Aid of Nebraska can rest assured their dollars and efforts are well placed.

According to the 2009 Operating Statement (page 15), 89 cents out of every dollar that Legal Aid received went for program services – directly helping low-income Nebraskans deal with their legal issues.

"In 2009 we spent just over \$600,000 for administration and fundraising," said Execu-

tive Director Dave Pantos. "That means more than \$4.86 million went for program services."

"There are very few service organizations anywhere with that high of a service to cost ratio," Pantos added.

Because of an ever-growing population of Nebraskans who qualify for our services, Legal Aid makes continuous efforts to stretch our effectiveness. The following inititiatives and special services ensured that in 2009 we served more deserving people.

- Legal Aid's Farm/Ranch and Rural Response Hotline helps rural residents to get accurate information on financial matters, law, risk management and counseling or referrals to other community groups. This is managed by the Bancroft office in partnership with Interchurch Ministries of Nebraska.
- Information on tax rights and responsibilities is delivered throughout the state to English as a
 Second Language and low-income populations via our Low-Income Tax Clinics. Participants also get advice and representation in controversies involving the IRS.
- Most of our legal services begin with the statewide toll-free **AccessLine®** where attorneys and paralegals offer advice, brief service, referrals and extended representation.
- As part of our Elder Law Program® attorneys travel throughout northeast Nebraska to
 provide legal education, advice, brief services and direct representation and help with wills,
 durable powers of attorney and health care directives.
- For those age 60 and over, the **ElderAccessLine®** is staffed by an experienced paralegal who confers with an attorney. There is no income eligibility restriction.
- Civil legal services are available to Migrant Workers via the Migrant Worker Program.





PAI Attorneys Work Hard to Help Legal Aid

Steven Twohig of Fremont is one of many private attorneys who devote part of their practice to assisting Nebraska's low-income population at reduced rates through Legal Aid of Nebraska's Private Attorney Involvement (PAI) program.

Since 2003, Twohig – a 2001 graduate of the University of Nebraska's College of Law – has taken on PAI work in addition to his usual caseload at Twohig Law Office. Since then, he's handled more than 70 cases for Legal Aid. Twohig's first PAI cases came at a critical time in his career, too, as he formed his own practice that same year after working for one-and-a-half years at another firm.

Twohig's PAI caseload differs little from his day-to-day work. "Basically, I handle all kinds of cases," Twohig says. "But I don't represent rapists, pedophiles or domestic abusers."

Of all his cases during his seven-year tenure as a PAI attorney, Twohig's first case sticks out the most. It was then that he learned of Legal Aid's commitment to those most vulnerable...and of the firm's commitment to providing thorough preparatory work in prescreening cases. This process allows the PAI attorney to have as much information as necessary to move forward with each case, making the outcomes much more predictable.

"These people who come to Legal Aid have taken the first step in reversing their cycle of abuse. And in the case of abuse, it's a double

winner for me because I'm able to help someone move away from an abusive person in their life and, at the same time, have a good chance of winning the case.

"Legal Aid is helpful because they prepare each case but don't micro-manage you as you go along."

Ultimately, Twohig says, the most rewarding gratification comes from not just winning cases, but in having a positive, direct impact on the lives of grateful people.
